To the Salem UM Church Family-

This March we will be living into Lent and celebrating our journey on the last Sunday of the month with the Resurrection of our Lord. As was mentioned in February's newsletter this Lent we are exploring Forgiveness: forgiving others and experiencing forgiveness in our lives.

The concept of forgiveness is central to biblical teaching and our faith. The Bible states that each of us is created in the image of God. To me this means that God intended for each of us to resemble God in the world, that is, to show the world God's love and goodness. However, we consistently smudge that image by harming others and ourselves. And we smudge that image when we are not faithful to God. All this is categorized as sin. Our sin separates us from God and each other. We are fractured and broken by our sin. Thus we live in a world of conflict, unrest, pain, resentment, and hate. This kind of world is not what God wants for us. God offers us an alternative to fix the brokenness, to make amends, to reconcile, to become whole, and that is the gift of forgiveness.

Jesus is that gift. He came to live among us to show us that we can be reconciled to God and with each other. He verbally forgave people of their sins. His ultimate act of forgiveness was given while he was dying on the cross when he said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23: 34). (NRSV) Thus the cross becomes a symbol of forgiveness of our sins. God in the form of Jesus came to reconcile us to God - to recover and heal that image of God in us even in his death on the cross. His resurrection shows us that there can be complete healing of the image of God in us, a new beginning,

today, and for all eternity. This is why we shout, "Alleluia!" during Easter! We are a forgiven people who have been given a new beginning!

As we journey to the cross this Lent through the spiritual practice of forgiveness, we can ask ourselves these questions:

- From what sin do I need God's forgiveness?
- **†** Who do I need to forgive and why?
- **†** Who do I need to ask for forgiveness and why?
- **†** What struggles do I have with forgiveness?
- Can I recall a time when I received God's forgiveness?
- † Can I recall a time when I received the forgiveness of another?

James Oglethorpe, who established the colony of Georgia is said to have said to John Wesley, "I never forgive and I never forget." To which John Wesley is said to have responded, "Then Sir, I hope you never sin." The purpose of the season of Lent is to draw us closer to God by looking at what separates us from God, and admitting it. Through this process then, Christ's Crucifixion and Resurrection will take on new meaning for us. This is what living into Lent means: asking for, receiving, and offering forgiveness so we can be renewed and recreated in the image of God.

Buck Bartley was there to greet them while Bill Lavely supervised the buffet. SHARING OUR FAITH

One of the most dramatic moments of the 20th century, or of any century, was when the image of Earth, taken from space, was first broadcast to the world by Apollo astronauts. For the first time in history the whole of humanity was put into stunning context – everyone, every single person, every living thing, encompassed in a blue dot in an endless black void. Those images are worth contemplating forty years later. You might look at them today, they are easy to find on the internet. Look at them and ask yourself: What's wrong about these pictures? A blue disk in an endless black void ... Something is *missing*.

Stars. There are no *stars*! Don't believe me? Go to the NASA website and study all those pictures taken from the moon by the Apollo astronauts. You will not see any stars.

As a young boy who avidly followed every detail of the Apollo missions this revelation was at least as surprising and perplexing as that first image of the Earth from space. It was completely at odds with my expectations. I lived in the high desert of the American southwest, and would often climb down to the bottom of a nearby ravine at night, and then look up at the cloudless sky and see millions of stars. The milky way so dense and bright that it was a streak from

horizon to horizon. And I wondered, if I could see so much from the bottom of a ravine away from any city lights, how much more will the astronauts see from the moon? As it turned out, they saw nothing. Just an inklike black.

How is that? The truth is, we usually do not see light. We think we do. But what we actually see are the objects illuminated by light – not the light itself. When we look up at the night sky we see our atmosphere scattering the light from stars, but we do not see the light from the stars. Take away the atmosphere, and we see nothing at all. Turn on the light in your living room, and the walls and furniture illuminated by the light become visible. You might even see dust motes floating gently in the air. You might look at the lamp and see the glass of the bulb scattering the light. But, do you see the light itself?

For all we have learned about Nature, from subatomic particles through molecules and organisms to galaxies and beyond, the nature of light remains elusive. We can measure certain aspects of light – that is, if we think of light as a wave we can make predictions about how it will behave in certain circumstances. In other circumstances we have to forget about light being a wave and think of it as a particle instead, then its behavior once again becomes measureable and predictable. So which is it? Wave or particle? A physicist might answer "Both and neither." They are aspects of light that we can perceive, but neither is light itself. Every scientist learns this in elementary physics class, and then conveniently forgets it any time they want to badger a Christian about the Trinity.

After nearly thirty years as a scientist I've come to appreciate more and more how much of our universe is not only unknown, but essentially unknowable. Not directly, not with the means at our disposal. Light may still elude our understanding, but I know that light exists, because it is reflected in our world around us.

I have never had an epiphany moment. I sometimes wish I had that kind of faith. It would be a great comfort. But rather, I take comfort in seeing the light reflected in those who believe. To me, there is no more convincing evidence for the existence of the Light than the fact that people continue to orient Page 4

themselves towards it. Despite hardship, despite adversity and disappointment, despite persecution, there are always those who reflect the Light. Nothing in any science textbook can explain that. Our science books teach us that they should not exist. The whole discipline of evolutionary biology agonizes over the perverse fact that some people will do good though it does not benefit themselves directly in any way that can be measured. And yet so much good is done in the world at great personal cost. There is Light in our world. I see it reflected in the Church.

My long journey into Faith has been a gradual one. I've travelled from vehement and vocal atheist to a member of the body of Christ. It happened one step at a time, walking with people who always seemed to see something better in life, who always seemed to have hope and a sustaining power. When my life was at its darkest, they shone brightest. Eventually it dawned on me that the friends I was drawn to didn't just happen to be Christians – I was drawn to them *because* they were Christians. And I've been trying to follow the light they see ever since.

I want to take this opportunity to say how much I have enjoyed having Dean Preville play along with me during the services when the choir sings. He is an artist with the drum set and creatively adds music that complements the variety of styles found in the anthems and hymns for the service. After sharing his talent at Salem on Sunday mornings he drives to Westminster every Sunday to play along with a full praise band in the Church of the Ascension Episcopal Church at their afternoon service "Ascend." He plays along with George Sterling, Chuck and Reverend Sue's son. Dean also plays with a rock band that can be found performing at various places in Montgomery County on the weekends.

The Church Choir's goal this year has been to lead the congregation in learning new songs from the green hymnal, "Worship & Song." There are quiet, contemplative versions as well as louder, group sing-along recordings. But most importantly think about the words as you listen and sing:

Salem SNAP Challenge for Lent 2013

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as the Food Stamp Program, supports those whose wages are too low to lift them out of poverty by helping them to put food on the table.

The SNAP/Food Stamp Challenge gives participants a view of what life can be like for millions of low-income Americans. Most participants take the Challenge for one week, living on a little over \$4 per

day worth of food – the average food stamp benefit. Challenge participants are forced to make food shopping choices on a limited budget, and often realize how difficult it is to avoid hunger, afford nutritious foods, and stay healthy with too few resources.

While living on a food stamp budget for just a week cannot come close to the struggles encountered by lowincome families week after week and month after month, it does provide those who take the Challenge with a new perspective and greater understanding.

We at Salem have been supporting low-income families in Montgomery County stretch their food dollars through Olney Help, the United Methodist food pantry in Wheaton, the Lord's Table, and food baskets at Christmas and Thanksgiving. By taking the SNAP Challenge, we can become more aware of the challenges facing our neighbors, and perhaps think of some additional ways to address problems of hunger in our community.

Challenge Guidelines

- 1. Pick at least five consecutive days for the Challenge between now and Easter.
- 2. Spend **no more than \$4.29 per person per day for all food and beverage** during the Challenge. \$4.29 per day is the Maryland SNAP level for 2012.
- 3. All food purchased and eaten during the Challenge week, including fast food and dining out, must be included in the total spending.
- 4. During the Challenge, eat only food that you purchase for the project. Do not eat food that you already own. Coffee counts! Do not drink coffee, tea, or other beverages unless you include them in your SNAP food budget.
- 5. Avoid accepting free food from friends, family, or at work.
- 6. Keep track of receipts on food spending and take note of your experiences throughout the week. If you like, post your experiences on the Salem Facebook page. Think about your overall nutrition and health; if you ate these foods and only these foods for a year, could you stay healthy?
- 7. Remember that those who are on SNAP also have limited income for gasoline and may rely on public transportation. Try to limit your shopping to the one store nearest your house or near a bus route.
- 8. Invite others to join you.
- 9. Join us on Sunday, April 7 after church for a discussion of our SNAP Challenge experiences. Perhaps God will use this Challenge to spark some fresh ideas for serving our neighbors in need.

New Adult Study Series Begins March 7:

Seeing Gray in a World of Black and White: Thoughts on Religion, Morality and Politics

Everyone agrees that America is polarized, with ever-hardening positions held by people less and less willing to listen to one another. Even small communities such as Salem are experiencing polarization. No one agrees on what to do about it.

One solution that hasn't yet been tried, says Adam Hamilton, is for thinking people of faith to model for the rest of the country a richer, more thoughtful conversation on the political, moral, and religious issues that divide us.

In this five-week video and discussion series, we will seek a faithful, compassionate and mutually respectful way forward. The goal is for all of us to listen, learn, and see truth as multi-sided; to make our voices heard; and to love those with whom we disagree.

HEALTH NEWS FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Hypertension or High Blood Pressure – What is it?

As blood moves through your body it places a certain force on the walls of the blood vessels. That force is called blood pressure. Blood pressure readings are made up of the systolic (sis-TOL-ik) or the highest pressure in your artery when the heart is pumping blood and the diastolic (di-a-STOL-ik) or lowest pressure in your artery. Blood pressure is written as 120/80 with the systolic reading being listed first.

Hypertension or high blood pressure occurs when your blood pressure is higher than normal – that is, greater than 140/90 for a long period of time. If you have a blood pressure reading of between 120/80 and 139/89 you would be considered prehypertensive. Normal blood pressure is **less than** 120/80.

High blood pressure is a lifelong disease. If not controlled, it can lead to heart or kidney disease, stroke or damage to the eyes (retinopathy).
