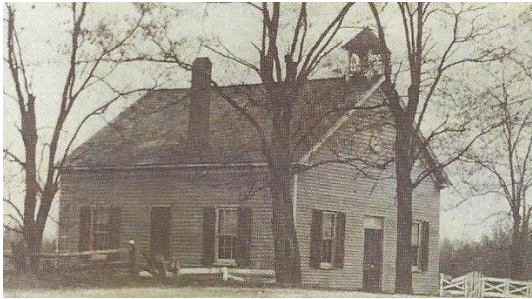

Salem UMC 180 years:

Still Loving, Serving, and Celebrating
People don't live to be 180 years old, but churches do! Yes, Salem Methodist Protestant Church held its first worship on Sunday, May 26, 1833. So that makes Salem 180 years old. And yes, we are still, loving, serving, and celebrating! There are no records of what the congregation was like in 1833 or how many people made up the congregation, but how they embodied their faith has been passed down through the generations to what and who we are today.

In 1833 the world was both different from and similar to 2013. Different in that our nation was still young. Andrew Jackson was serving his second term as president. Life was much slower. One either walked or traveled under the power of horses. Steam power was in its infancy. There was no electricity, centralized heating or air conditioning, telecommunications, nor any other conveniences that we take for granted today. Yet similar in that the early part of the nineteenth century was a time of spiritual, moral, and civic instability in our country. The cities were hubs for crime, promiscuity, and alcoholism. Many put

their trust in Reason rather than in God and stopped going to church. In many ways, the cultural conflicts of the early nineteenth century are similar to the cultural conflicts today. What did Christians stand for back then? Preaching the Gospel, reducing poverty, promoting Christian morals, and educating both children and adults. Because of their efforts, a revival of Christianity occurred in the nineteenth century known as the Second Great Awakening.

Today many put their trust in something other than God and aren't going to church either. In fact many see the church as irrelevant. In the midst of the cultural wars today, what do we as Christians really stand for? In this anniversary year for Salem, we will be trying to answer this question in our Summer Sermon Series. We would love to hear from you. What do you think Christians should stand for 180 years later in 2013?

One thing is certain; God's love for humanity has existed long before 1833 and will exist long after 2013. Thanks be to God! But how is God counting on us to proclaim Christ in a non-Christian environment?

Legacy Fund, Five Years Later

Last month we celebrated the 180th Birthday of Salem United Methodist Church in Brookeville. We also celebrated the 5th Anniversary of the creation of our Legacy Fund. So perhaps this is an appropriate time to review our accomplishments thanks to the Fund. The Fund was the brainchild of Anna and Clyde Unglesbee, and the capital campaign to fund the Fund was introduced to the Salem membership on May 4th, 2008. Clyde challenged our church family to participate in a three year capital campaign to raise \$175,000 to honor 175 years in the life of Salem.

Thus the last of Clyde's grand visions for Salem was born, named the Legacy Fund. The source and purpose of the Fund as Clyde presented it to the congregation was and is as follows:

- 1. The Legacy Fund will be created and sustained from gifts, donations and bequests from church members and**

other friends of Salem. All contributions to the Legacy Fund will be maintained separate from the regular operating budget.

- 2. The purpose of the Fund is to provide funding for items that are outside the normal operating budget. They may include, but are not limited to: (a) capital improvements; (b) ground and building repairs; and (c) financing of new and innovative programs.**

In response to Clyde's challenge, over 100 of our church members and friends contributed more than \$195,000 to the Fund, \$99,500 of which was a bequest from the estate of Barbara (Bobbie) Charles. The current balance in the Legacy Fund is almost \$70,000. Since inception, the Fund has provided \$126,000 to finance important improvements, such as:

1. An outstanding loan from Sandy Spring Bank of \$28,000 was paid off.
2. In the Parsonage, we removed old carpet, refinished hardwood floors, painted the interior, installed new kitchen flooring, garage door opener, new furnace, and energy efficient vinyl clad windows.
3. In the Community Hall, the Church School area was painted, installed clear plastic windows in all doors to conform to Safe Sanctuary standards, and all new air-conditioning. Downstairs the Social Hall was completely remodeled, new furnace and base board heating units installed, and stairs carpeted.
4. Improvement to the Sanctuary included exterior painting, carpentry repairs to the base of the bell tower, chimney and flue repairs.
5. And outside, we have all new mowing equipment, built a flood control swale at 310 Market Street to divert storm water from our property which was inundating one of our neighbors, paid for

professional landscaping assistance for all of our front gardens and the playlot, and installed a new, high-tech locking system for all exterior doors.

All in all, we think Clyde would be very proud, as we should be also, of all we have accomplished with his dream. The Legacy Fund has provided the capital needed at critical points the past five years. Thank you all for your past and future support of the Fund as we go forward in God's ever changing, always exciting new world.

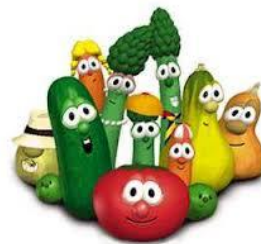
Ministering to our Children

FROM THE CONGREGATION



The windmills in their brilliant reds and yellows to represent the “tongues of fire” that fell on the disciples and all that were gathered in the Upper Room on the day of Pentecost. May 19th was Pentecost Sunday and Rev. Sue’s message was entitled “Fire.”

Since I have started working on the newsletter, I have not written anything of my thoughts for publication since I do most of the write-ups on the stories in the newsletter. However, during the sermon on Pentecost Sunday, Rev. Sue presented a series of questions that would not leave my thoughts. All of them together basically asked the question “What do you think of church?”

After giving us a few minutes in group(s) discussion, Rev. Sue called us back to worship and asked us to comment on our discussion. Several people made comments, some of which I couldn’t hear, but what I did hear sounded good. I fought with myself in making a comment and finally “just had to.” The church is a building the congregation built in 1833 and called it God’s House. A place for God to dwell? No! We dedicated the building to God and asked Him to meet us there.

There is a song we sing at Salem that says in part “I am the church, you are the church, WE are the church together...” God’s house is in our hearts and souls. We meet at “God’s house” as often as we can to share our faith and renew our spirits. This is done in several ways. To name a few: fellowship, music and sermons from the word of God which include scriptures and maybe even a little history.

Let's talk about OUR church, Salem United Methodist Church. When we walk in the door, the first thing we do is greet our brothers and sisters in Christ. As you shake their hands or give them a Christian hug you are passing God's love between you. That love spreads when strangers walking through the door can feel it and know "God lives here." Have I just contradicted myself? I said the building was not God's dwelling! So think about it; you come in and bring God with you, God is living there in you, I come in and bring God with me, and so on. When the service starts, God and God's love have filled the house. With the addition of the scripture reading and the music add the message God has given our Pastor, and our love for God is increased even more than what we came in with. What role will the Church have in a Brave New World of genetic manipulation? Are there special obligations for scientists who are also Christian? Can scientists stay true to their Christian principles, or even voice them in their workplace? If you're a scientist, do you feel that you have to hide your Christianity at work and take care in what you say?

You can also click on a link and register as a donor in only a few minutes. **It's easy to do!** Here's how to do it using Facebook: **1.** Go to your profile page; **2.** Where you type your status event, click on "Life Event"; then **3.** Click "Health & Wellness" and then "Organ Donation"; **4.** Enter all the details you want to share with your FB friends; then **5.** Click "Save."

To register officially through Donate Life America (a non-profit alliance of state and national registries), either click on "sign up with the appropriate registry" before you save your Life Event or go directly to [www.donatelifemaryland.org](http://www.donatelifemaryland.org) and follow the instructions.

"Mom appreciated the card sent by Joann Keister, It's displayed in her room..."

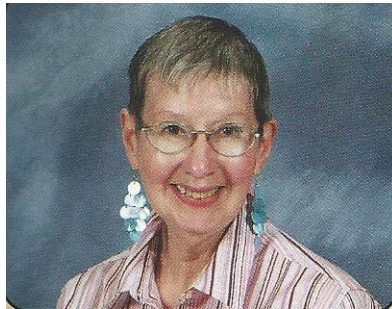
Prayer Shawls:
