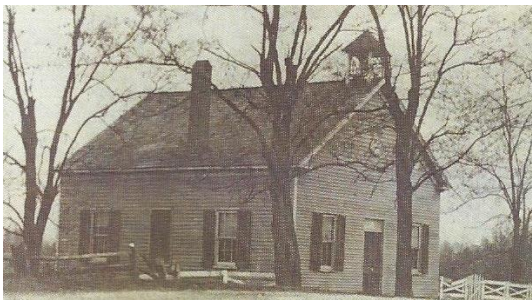

180 Years and Still Serving

Twenty years ago, my dear wife Alice, suggested I try to find us a Methodist Church.

I grew up a Methodist and Alice grew up a Catholic. Alice, being divorced, could no longer be fully accepted in the Catholic Church. She was a loving, faithful Christian and missed church greatly.

I told her that even though we both were divorced, the Methodist Church would accept us. She had never been to a Protestant service as that was not allowed by her Church. She asked me to search for a Church I would like and then we would go together.

I like small churches and decided to try Salem first. On Easter Sunday, 1993, I entered Salem's front door to find it already full. Being nervous and not knowing anyone, I found a spot to stand in the back. I was hoping to remain unobserved, but that was not to be.

Rev. Mark Waddell saw me standing and called out, "Sir, would you like to come up and sit with the Choir?" Everyone turned around to see who he was speaking to. I very quickly shook my head

no. Rev. Mark said “Soon there will be empty seats when the children leave for Sunday School.”

When they left, I quickly found a seat and proceeded to thoroughly enjoy the rest of the service. When the service was over, many people came up to me to welcome me and urge me to return. I remember Clyde and Anna Unglesbee were among the first. Rev. Mark was gracious and welcoming. I had found a Church home.

I told Alice I did not have to visit other churches as Salem was for us. We both attended the next week and she loved it also. We still do.

September 22 was a special day at Salem; three children were Baptised. To explain to the children what was happening, Rev. Janet explained the ordinance of Baptism to them. The story about John the Baptist baptising to make a new start in life from the men who had more food and clothing than he needed, the soldier and the tax collector. Once they were baptised their life changed, they shared what they had, used their authority wisely and only took what was due. When Jesus came to be baptised John felt he should be baptised by Jesus rather than the other way around. However Jesus explained to John that it must be so as the Father commanded.
