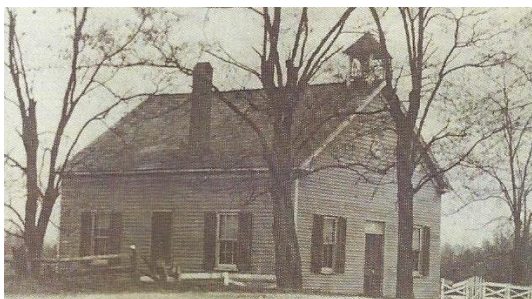

### TO THE SALEM UM CHURCH COMMUNITY



Two hundred years ago the village of Brookeville was the commercial hub in this area. With the surrounding farmlands and a mill on each side of town, Brookeville became a market place for goods and services as well as agricultural products. Settled by Quakers who believed that the “Inner-light” of God resides in every person, this village was distinct in that it was a community of mutual respect and social consciousness. The Quakers practiced plainness, thrift, pacifism, and opposed slavery. Their ideals and beliefs were deemed progressive for the era. For instance, Brookeville had a sizable free black population. The residents of the town were notable surveyors, inventors, and agriculturalists who experimented in new farming techniques. In late August of 1814, their lives changed when the British came up the Potomac to attack our nation's capital.

Responding to the threat of attack, Washington families packed up what they could and headed north. The Town of Brookeville was located on a paved post road that linked Washington with the north. After walking for about ten hours, these refugees stumbled upon this progressive, pacifist village. Here they sought refuge as they received reports of the British setting fire to the federal buildings. The House and State Departments packed up important national documents. The Bank of Washington and the Bank of Columbia packed up their specie. All these came to Brookeville where they were kept safe in the post office in Caleb Bentley's home. The post office was considered a secured facility because it had iron bars on the windows (and they are still there!). The streets were filled with carriages, wagons, and troops. The residents opened their homes providing lodging and food to strangers. This pacifist village offered their hospitality to all refugees, including the troops who were in retreat. Their houses were filled to capacity. And then at nine in the evening of Friday, August 26 a knock came on the door of Caleb Bentley's house. Could they house one more? Yes, they could and their guest was introduced to them as the President of

the United States! President Madison and his men stayed in Brookeville that night and left the next day after it was deemed safe to return to Washington.

On Saturday, August 30 and Sunday, August 31, the Town of Brookeville is remembering the Bicentennial of this event when it was both a refugee center and Capital For A Day. This is a perfect opportunity for Salem to offer hospitality to the many guests who will be visiting our town. We will be providing a place of refreshment and refuge. (See below how you can be part of this great event.)

The Book of Hebrews records “Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it” (Hebrews 13:2). We never know just to whom we might be offering hospitality. But I know that others will see the heart of Salem this weekend, a heart like our Quaker neighbors expressed, God’s love to all.

Then on Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup>, Anne Ennes told us about ‘Stone Soup.’



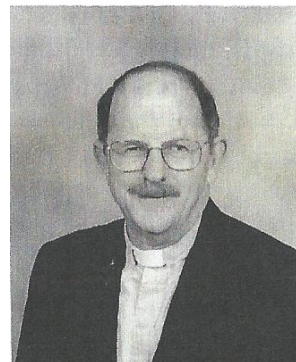
