Dear friends and members of Salem,

I am excited about sharing this year with you in ministry. I am eager to get to know you as we worship, serve, and learn together. As a way of introduction, let me share with you a bit about my journey: I was born and raised in York, Pennsylvania and all of my immediate family members still live there. My parents generously care for my two cats as well as their own two dogs while I am at school. I have a younger sister in her senior year of college and a younger brother who is married with two children.

I graduated from Grove City College with a degree in English, Secondary Education and taught a variety of English classes. My favorite class was British Literature at Pine Grove Area High School which allowed me to teach great stuff like *Hamlet*, Postmodern poetry, and Anglo-Saxon riddles. I left that career to attend seminary and pursue my calling to ordained ministry.

When the idea of becoming a pastor popped into my brain, I had a wealth of arguments ready to negate it: I'm not knowledgeable, experienced, significant, or good enough. God's response came through the radio. When I don't hear God's voice in scripture, I often hear it in music. This is how God got my attention on a Monday morning in March. It seemed that each of my concerns was addressed by the next song on the radio.

I suddenly understood and accepted that God had already given me guidance, help, and answers; I simply was not listening. Instead, I was arguing and delaying. I was freshly overwhelmed with the truth of God's grace and realized that as a pastor I could and should be weak and imperfect, yet strengthened by Christ. My life is full of lessons teaching me to rely on God. I have found that when I call out, I am provided with undefeatable strength. I was fully assured that I would not be alone when making this change but closer to God than ever before. After accepting this fact I allowed myself to really consider saying yes, following God, and dedicating my life to God in service to the church.

All of this came to me as I turned onto school property. I remember wishing I had time to explore this decision immediately instead of teaching for the next eight hours. This is when I noticed the strangely vacant parking lot as a colleague pulled her car up next to mine and ironically asked, "Didn't you get the call?" School was cancelled that day due to a power outage. I thanked God and I went home to explore my next steps: seminary and candidacy.

I am already grateful for the role you will all play in my formation as a pastor. I look forward to being part of a vibrant community where fellowship, Bible literacy, and service make church relevant across generations and throughout a diverse local community. May we experience authentic growth as disciples learning to help each other love and live like Jesus. It is my hope that our ministry together will engage us all in our God-given callings to build the kingdom of God.

## Your Help Needed

From Olney Help: "As one of our ongoing supporters you know that Olney Help is an allvolunteer non-profit organization that has provided assistance to our neighbors in need since 1969. For more than 46 years, Olney Help has been meeting its goal of 'People Helping People' with emergency financial and food assistance to residents of our area. We have been able to consistently provide this support to the greater Olney area because of the generosity of our local donor community. We currently have a crisis because our current property, our location for the last 29 years, has been sold and we must vacate the pantry before the end of the year. As a result we are starting a Capital Campaign to build a new pantry facility. We are partnering with the Sandy Spring Volunteer Fire Department to construct a 14 x 40foot building on their land.

We are reaching out to you and your congregation to ask for your support. We need funds to buy a structure and maintain it. In addition, we need building supplies and expertise to finish the inside of the building so that we can safely store the non-perishable food that you so kindly donate.

This is our largest undertaking and one that must be done rapidly if we are to be able to continue providing food to those in need in our community.
