

MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE

March 29, 2018, the congregations of Mt Carmel, Salem and St. Paul United Methodist Churches gathered at St. Paul's in Laytonsville to celebrate Maundy Thursday or if you wish Holy Thursday. This is the day when Jesus celebrated the Passover meal with his disciples and the night he was betrayed by Judas Iscariot.

As we sang "Take our Bread, we ask you; take our hearts we love you; take our lives, O Father we are yours, we are yours," our hearts filled with the joy of knowing we are indeed His. Scripture readings by Meg Clemmer, Jo Schonewolf, Our Seminary Intern,, Rev. Sue and Rev. Jean Lee of St. Paul, after which Rev. Lee answered the question "What is Maundy Thursday."

John 13:1-5 (KJV)¹ Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end. ² And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him; ³ Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God; ⁴ He riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself. ⁵ After that he poureth water into a bason, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded.



After the hand or feet washing everyone was dismissed.

SCIENCE AND RELIGION SMALL GROUP

Timing: Wednesdays, March 28-May 2 7:00 pm

Description: When we hear about science and religion in the news or in culture, we often hear about an unending, unresolvable conflict. This can leave us wondering how we got here and what we can do about it. Join us for six weeks as we talk about the roots of the conflict narrative between science and religion, how we think about both science and religion, and our responses to the conflict as Christians.

Dialogue rather than conflict (listening to both science and religion)

4/25: "The heaven declare the glory of God" Integration rather than conflict (awe and wonder in both science and religion)



GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE THE JOURNEY TO THE CROSS

(A note from Velma, your Publisher: This story cannot be told in one or two paragraphs so I ask that you bear with me as I take you briefly on the Journey to the Cross. I also ask that you grab your Bible and read the scriptures as you read of each station.)

This Journey is shared by Mt. Carmel, Salem, and St. Paul United Methodist Churches. Come along with us as we retrace Jesus' Journey to the Cross.

STATION #1: CREATION

There was no Scripture at this station but a quote from N. T. Wright's **For All God's Worth** and another quote by Fr Richard Rohr.



Beautiful pictures of God's Creation are rotation on the screen we were asked to reflect on the image of the infant world in all its perfection.

Now, take a moment to think of the good things God has created in this world.

STATION #2: THE FALL

"The Fall, the Fall, God the fall of Man, the fruit is found in every eye and every hand..." (Gungor) Read Romans 6:23.



Reflect on "Everything is broken now..."We were instructed to pick a stone from a dish of stones and carry it around with us during the service as a representative of our sins. (A little stone can become heavy!)

STATION #3: THE GARDEN

We were invited to kneel if we were able as we read Matthew 26: 45-46 and to reflect on the pain and suffering Jesus was about to go through.

Reflect: Is there an area in your life where you

need to make a choice to love ad sacrifice – even if it comes with a cost?



Behind the candles is a small fountain which gave a calming feeling.

STATION #4: BETRAYED BY JUDAS

Read Matthew 26:14-16



The video showed Judas with the Chief Priest, then Jesus and the Disciples in the Garden when Judas betrays Him. Reflect: How much is your integrity worth? Would you betray a friend for twenty thousand dollars? And, why do we seem to compromise our values so quickly for money?

STATION #5: PETER'S DENIAL AND OF OUR DENIAL OF CHRIST

Read Matthew 26:69-75



Jacob Weinberger is our guide at this Station. Reflect: Sometimes our betrayal is not motivated by financial gain but rather social acceptance. A brief quote by Brennan Manning is given and we were asked to think of a time when we in some form denied our Lord. We were asked to write it down and place the paper in the fire.

STATION #6: JESUS IS WHIPPED

Read Matthew 27:27-31a.



As we entered Salem's Memorial Garden the cross was draped in a white robe, our instructions was to take the provided red felt marker and strike the loose part of the clothing making a red mark. Reflect on all the things Jesus underwent before and while on the cross. "O the divine disgrace of our Savior"

Our next stop was inside the Church.

(On a personal note, I found this to be the hardest of all, it was very hard to pick up that red pen and place a stripe on the cloth representing our Christ.)

STATION #7: NAILING AND FORGIVENESS

Read Luke 23:33-34



As we entered the building, we were directed to the Choir Room. As you can see there was a board with partially embedded nails. Our instructions were to reflect on the fact that even as Jesus was dying on the cross He asked the Father to forgive those who put Him there. We were to use the provided hammer and drive the nail into the wood as means of forgiveness to those who have harmed us.

STATION #8: "IT IS FINISHED"

Read Matthew 19:28-30.



Upon entering the Sanctuary we were directed to the Altar where candles were lit. We were asked to reflect on 4 points: Can you feel the presence of death? Can you feel the heaviness of despair? Can you feel the sorrow, emptiness, and confusion, and finally Can you feel the darkness? We were then instructed to extinguish one candle as a symbol of Jesus dying.

STATION #9: "LETTING GO"

Read Romans 6:2-14



Our last stop was at the baptismal font. Here we were given five items to reflect on: Let the rock in your hand symbolize every sinful attitude and action, all that you wish you weren't, the shadow within, the brokenness you have experienced, and finally the brokenness you have caused. We were directed to drop the rock in the baptismal font and let your sin die with Christ.


We were then asked to sit quietly and reflect on the journey we had just taken. The two Pastors extinguished the remaining burning candles, except one. It represented the light of Christ which is eternal. It was taken with them as they left the altar. From the back of the sanctuary the four ministerial members read additional details of that Friday long ago. Then the congregation sang "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross." When the hymn ended, we were dismissed and we left in silence.

- 4. After it was reported that Jesus rose from the dead, two followers went home to Emmaus. They were joined by a man. How did they recognize who this man was?


Answers below.
