TO THE SALEM UM CHURCH COMMUNITY

What a wonderful Easter celebration we have had this year! I hope our Lenten study on rethinking heaven, the Resurrection, and the meaning of the church made the entire Holy Week experience more meaningful. I found it so. I have known for some time that the church's purpose is to be Christ's presence in the world as we serve those who the world forgets, but I never quite thought about the church as a "Signpost of Hope" for the world.

Signposts serve a purpose. They point us in the right direction or show us where to go. Even though a Global Positioning System usually is an accurate method in showing us how to get somewhere, we still look for the street signs that are mentioned by the GPS. When one travels in the country, road signs are not as prevalent. There are crossroads with no signs at all. Anyone who doesn't know the area can feel lost. We are grateful when we find those signs at crossroads that give us direction and maybe even tell us how many miles to the nearest towns. Signs help us go in the right direction.

All one has to do is read or listen to current events to know that there is a need for direction. Hope is needed. During this Easter Season, we at Salem will be looking at various ways the church is a "Signpost of

Hope" to the world. And hopefully, discover some ways in which we at Salem can be a "Signpost of Hope." Jesus came to show us the way of Hope and Salvation. God is expecting us to be agents of hope to others while the Holy Spirit empowers us and graces us with the gifts to do it.

Salem already offers hope. Many sponsor a Compassion Child which provides education, community, and faith formation for children in underprivileged areas of the world. We along with our Conference are raising money towards the UMC's campaign to end malaria in the next few years. We already have over one-fifth of the commitment of \$2500 raised. These are two areas of ministry which we will highlight during the Easter Season. Another signpost of the UMC in which we will explore will be the work of justice and peace that the United Methodist Women do locally and globally.

I am honored to serve a church that in so many ways is being a Signpost of Hope. Yet, every day thousands of cars drive past our historic white church. God knows the people who are driving by. God knows what their doubts and despairs are. How can Salem be a Signpost of Hope to those that drive by Brookeville every day? How can Salem reach into our community and offer hope?

A TIME FOR CHILDREN

Picture this. About a dozen children just a short time ago was running everywhere looking for hidden eggs. The excitement of the day was enough to put them in overdrive and overdrive was the key note of today's events. However, being the pro that she is, Rev. Sue had the situation well under control.



Her lesson today was about the empty tomb and she used eggs to demonstrate just that. She spoke of the egg hunt and the fun they had, then explained that the egg is a symbol of the Christian faith. Rev. Sue showed the children three Easter Baskets each having eggs of some sort in it. She explained the first was her Grandmother's, the one she had as a child and it was very old; then she showed them her Dad's basket, not quite as old as the first one; finally a newer basket. Then she showed them a plastic egg and when she opened it, inside was a piece of candy. She then chose a real egg, and opened that to reveal the raw egg which was put into a bowl to show that there was indeed

an egg inside the shell, symbolizing that Jesus was indeed in the Tomb. She then gave each child a plastic egg, instructing them to wait to open it. When the last child had an egg she told them to open the egg. It was empty - just as the tomb was empty the very first Easter morning. The children paired up and clicked their eggs with their partner and proclaimed, "He is risen, He is risen indeed!"

A WALK IN THE LABYRINTH

This is Velma Durant talking, not the publisher of the newsletter, not speaking for Salem UMC, just me. I want to tell you about a walk I took on

Saturday, April 19. It's something I will never forget.



Rev. Sue has been talking about the labyrinth a while and I decided to “check it out.” When I walked into the Community Hall there sat Rev. Sue and Janice Fitts from St. Bartholomew’s Episcopal Church in Laytonsville. Janice brought and set up the labyrinth. In front of them were two baskets. They contained socks - yes socks. Unless you had medical reasons it was requested you use a pair of the socks or your own socks for your walk. I looked to the right and before me lay the labyrinth.

The instructions read: “The labyrinth is a spiritual tool. It is a walking meditation and a path of prayer. Walking the labyrinth helps us see our lives in the context of a path, a pilgrimage. It helps us realize we are not human beings on a spiritual path, but a spiritual being on a human path. ... A labyrinth is not a maze. There is only one path in and out. - There is not one or wrong way to walk the labyrinth. Follow your own desired (fast or slow) pace. Walking the path is described in four stages as the four R’s:

- † Reflection or Remembering
- † Releasing
- † Receiving
- † Returning”

I did not copy the complete instructions, I picked out what I thought was important.

As I began my walk, there was soft music playing in the background, soon I didn’t know it was there. I prayed first for myself that I would be worthy to serve as an ambassador for our King. Then I prayed for Salem that we would be a lighthouse to our community, showing them the way to the saving grace of our Savior. Then the music changed, I don’t know what it was but I felt like raising my head toward heaven and singing

praises to The Father, Son and Holy Spirit! Crying, yes I did. I couldn’t help it for ‘Oh the joy that floods my soul – something happened and now I know, He touched me and made me whole!’ I remarked to Rev. Sue that it’s something we should do at least once a month. In our hustle and bustle of life we sometimes put our spiritual life in the background. We say our daily prayers. We thank God for our meals but we are just too busy to stop and listen. What a joy it was to spend the short time I did concentrating on the One who died for ME!

180 YEARS AND STILL SERVING

During the past few months we have been concentrating on comments and memories of members and former members of our congregation to provide articles for this column. The thought came to mind to review our former pastors and members “gone before us.”

The following words were taken from the 1984 Anniversary Celebration, the picture from an earlier date:

“I came to Salem at a challenging time, January, 1986. Your pastor, Jean Klauda, had been called away to become pastor of a church whose pastor had died. I was asked to fill in for six months until your new pastor’s appointment would begin in July. As someone ordained in the Episcopal Church, it was a joy for me to get to know all of you and how the Methodist Church works. You were most welcoming.

As my brief tenure at Salem was coming to an end, you found out who your new pastor was going to be. One of the senior, wise gentlemen of the church (Harry Musgrove) – who literally had

helped to build the church, shook my hand one day at the end of the service. With surprise and a bit of irritation he looked at me and said, 'You aren't staying!' 'No,' I answered. 'But I have met your new pastor and I know that you are going to like him.' This was met with silence and the shake of his head. He stood there for a while and then began to walk away. And as he left me standing there he said, 'I don't think that I can get used to a man!' I can't tell you how that has fed my soul in the years since.

Much has changed in our lives since I had the privilege of serving as your pastor, but day in and day out I think of you because of the gift you gave me. When I left you gave me a clock that sits on our mantel. When it chimes I remember my sisters and brothers in Christ at Salem."

MAUNDY THURSDAY WORSHIP SERVICE

April 17, 2014

A worshipful service was held at the Ashton UMC, with Rev. Jenny Cannon, Ashton's pastor, and Rev. Jim Pugh the pastor of Mt Carmel UMC in Sunshine and St. Paul's in Laytonsville, and Rev. Sue of Salem leading the service.

A combined choir under the direction of Rev. Pugh blessed us with several wonderful spiritual songs. A member of Ashton wrote a skit which portrayed Peter and Judas reflecting on their regrets after betraying of Jesus. As Gary Sherman (Peter) and Fred Ambrose (Judas) sat writing at a table, readers Buck Bartley (Judas), and Eric Johnson (Peter), alternately spoke off stage and out of sight.

Our own Rose Eide-Altman was at the Piano and joining her on the organ was her husband, David.

This beautiful time of worship allowed us to reflect on the twenty-four hours of pain and suffering our Lord endured so that we, simple mortals, could have Eternal Life. What started with Adam, the first sin, ended with Christ dying on the cross so our sins are forgiven. It is finished!

For college biology professor Andy Waite, Darwinian evolution is the explanation for everything. 
