Dear Salem UM Church Community:

We are entering one of my favorite times of the year, Advent. In our consumerist culture, Advent is completely overlooked. For instance, when was the last time you saw an Advent wreath being sold in a store? To counter the culture of secular Christmas, the church focuses four Sundays before the birth of our Savior on his coming: the first coming, his birth, and his promised second coming. We pray, “Come, Lord Jesus, come.” But are we ready to receive him when he does come?

How does one receive Jesus the Christ? How

does one receive any gift? Are we grateful? Or do we think, “Oh, I don’t have a gift to give back?” Or do we think, “What an awful present? Why would anyone think of giving this?” When one is complimented, how is it received? Does it cause us embarrassment? Do we try to ignore it? Or are we grateful that someone notices? Receiving can be more difficult than giving. We give so much to everyone all the time. We give of ourselves to our families. We give of ourselves in our jobs, community, and church. Giving is a type of serving. We are called by God to serve. Serving is part of our worship. But, so is receiving. Our relationship with the Living Christ is both one of receiving and one of giving. We are to be open to receive the Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love that Christ has to offer. When we open our hands and hearts to receive from the Christ, then Christ comes. Christ comes as an infant, a teacher, a Crucified and Resurrected Savior. When we are open to receive from the Christ, we will be filled with Holy Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy. When we are open to receive, we are replenished and refreshed. Then we can give not out of duty and obligation, but from our hearts.

Each Christmas we sing, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Have you ever noticed the third verse? "How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given; so God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven. No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in."

How will we receive the dear Christ this Advent?

The warm welcome we received as we started our journey in the "little country church" that we loved from the first made us feel so embraced and comfortable. We loved our new cozy home and worshiping the Lord in the beautiful sanctuary each week was to us a privilege and joy we will never forget.

We shared the birth of our two daughters Jessalyn and Julie and the loss of Mark's mother and grandmother. How fondly we remember when the girls became the "youngest" United Methodist Women and how they enjoyed doing crafts with "Daddy's ladies."

You supported us through Libby's life-threatening health issue, and shortly thereafter her hip replacement. You welcomed our extended family during their frequent visits to our home and church and how blessed the girls were to have multiple grandparents within the church family.

Sunday services were the highlight of each week as we "went to the house of the Lord" to worship Him and bring praise to our God. So many Sundays, so many beautiful choir anthems. Loving hearts entwined as we sought Him Who is our All in All. So many of those "special services," Christmas Eve pageants (with little sheep falling over the communion railing), Easter

sunrise in the Salem graveyard –glorious (albeit COLD), and Children’s Sunday with the sanctuary decorated and FILLED with the sounds of children.

We wish we could mention all our memories – the talent shows, the puppet shows, the live nativities, the sausage grind, the picnics and the game Skippo we could never get the hang of. Most important, we remember events as shared with our dear friends. For that was what our time at Salem was about. It was walking on the path of this life, up on the mountaintops, as well as down through the valleys. It was trying to walk in a way worthy of the Lord, trying to share others’ burdens as well as our joys. It was knowing that none of us is perfect, but being able to love and forgive as Christ would have us do, so that the world could hopefully see us and be drawn to Him.

We at Salem have a lot to be thankful for and the ability to step in and help others is one of our greatest blessings. Thank you one and all.


