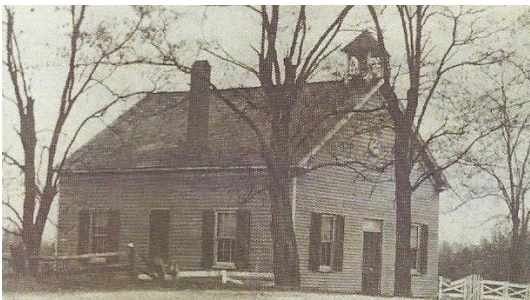

### TO THE SALEM UM CHURCH COMMUNITY

To the Salem UM Church Community,

Autumn with its cool temperatures and low humidity has arrived. In the church with the arrival of autumn comes Charge Conference. For those who may be unfamiliar with this term, Charge Conference is an annual meeting of the church with our District Superintendent. This person is appointed by our Bishop to oversee the churches in our area which is called the Central Maryland District. This annual meeting is both a report of the past year as well as visioning for our future.

This year our District Superintendent, Rev. Jongwoo (JW) Park, has asked each of the churches he supervises to consider two questions:

- † "What does the future of your church look like?"
- † "What do you believe that God is going to do with you?"

For the last two Church Council meetings, Deb Ambrose, the Church Council Chair has been asking the Council to be thinking and praying about the answers to these questions. Velma Durant, our newsletter editor, was the first one to respond in writing. She wrote that the first time she walked into Salem she felt that she "had come home. The love was overflowing...and I KNEW God was there. My disappointment came when I found out there was ONLY ONE SERVICE A WEEK. My thought was: can these people get enough of hearing God's word that He gives to the speaker that they don't need to come back? ...I can't imagine! So, as I have been praying about the dark sanctuary 7 nights a week, the thought came to me – Why not open the doors about 7 pm on Wednesday, no formal service but just a bunch of believers joined together in spirit and love, offering songs of praise, prayers and edification from members of the congregation, not necessarily assigned to speak but what's on your heart at that

moment - no gripes and complaints but glorifying God.”

Deb read Velma’s response to the September Church Council meeting. We discussed the fact that the number of those who are active in the church remains a much higher number than our average weekly attendance. Many have other obligations on Sunday mornings and cannot attend worship at that time. Would the congregation benefit from another worship time? So by the end of our discussion, we decided to have a separate time of informal worship on **Wednesday evenings for just 30 minutes, 7:00-7:30 pm**. There will be no set order of worship, no prescribed songs or prayers, but a time to praise God, pray, and be encouraged. We are calling this time **“Prayer and Share.”** Our first one will begin on **Wednesday, October 7**. So stop in after work, or after your dinner hour to praise and give thanks to our Lord and Savior, offer up prayers, and be encouraged for the rest of the week.

As we move into fall, Church Council met to hear about the various ministries of Salem and to begin to prepare for our upcoming Charge Conference. This will be held on Sunday,

Rev. Sue began the meeting with our devotion, focused on our charge to be disciples of Jesus Christ and to make disciples of all nations.

Concerns were shared for Janet Howes, Betty Bittner, the Van Druuffs, Caroline Herndon's great-granddaughter, Brindley, Doug Whalen, and Sharon Lyons' parents.

Fall classes are filling up (Covenant taught by Rev. Sue, and Not a Fan, led by Erin Wheeler).

Youth Group has begun and has several new members ☺.

The average Year-to-Date attendance for Sunday morning is 60.

Upcoming Calendar events were shared. The calendar on our website is not accurate. Suzanne Friis is working to fix the problem

We spent time considering two important questions that we have been asked to consider in preparation for Charge Conference. They are: What does the future of our church look like? and What do we believe God is going to do with us? We had a rich and honest discussion, and left charged to continue to pray for guidance in seeking answers to these questions. Kulley Bancroft shared the first draft of our church budget for 2016 and entertained comments and proposals for changes. This process will continue through the first half of October. The final budget will be presented to Council for approval at the October meeting.

Hasashi Yamagata shared minutes from the last SPRP meeting. Included in the minutes was a proposal to reimburse Erin Wheeler for mileage from Wesley Seminary to Salem 2 days a week. This was approved and added to the budget.

Connie Somerville shared minutes from the last Trustees meeting. She presented a very thorough report about the work that is ongoing by

the Trustees to improve, repair and maintain our buildings and grounds. Included in this report were budget requests for funds to support this ongoing work. These requests are increases in budgeted areas including maintenance, and permits and licenses. These increases will be reflected in the final budget.

Carole Roberts reported on the current status of our membership. Salem currently has 176 members. No one will be recommended for removal from our rolls at Charge Conference.

Rev. Sue is organizing a new members' class to begin soon.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

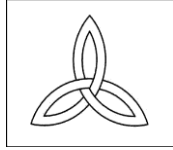

## **COVENANT BIBLE STUDY**

Covenant is an in-depth group Bible study in which participants read and discuss the Bible together, learning how to love God - and each other - better.

Three 8-episode segments explore a different aspect of Covenant life. Each will examine what Covenant means and the progression of a Covenant relationship with God. There are weekly readings from the Hebrew texts and the New Testament as well as a video by a biblical scholar to invoke discussion. Each segment has a book.

**CREATING:** Examines how the Covenant community is created and established.

**LIVING:** Focuses on how the community lives out their Covenant in faithful love—how it is applied to actual relationships in everyday life.

**TRUSTING:** Looks at the crises that sometimes call Covenant life into question, and how we are restored to trust in God when troubling things happen.
