#### TO THE SALEM UM CHURCH COMMUNITY



Rev. Dr. Sue Shorb-Sterling. To the Salem UM Church Community,

The blizzard of 2016 is behind us and hopefully it will remain singular. I have some good news! Liturgically speaking, spring is on the way. Lent begins on Feb 10 with Easter on March 27! Traditionally, Lent has been a season of selfexamination and repentance; that is, we are called to look at where we have strayed as a follower of Jesus, make confession, and get back on the right path. So how do we prepare yet again to celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus in the midst of a heated political presidential campaign? Yes, you read correctly. I put Jesus and our presidential campaign in the same sentence. In the midst of a heated political race we as people who claim to be Christians need to take a close look at who we follow. What role does our Christian faith play in our political views? Or should it? In order to answer these questions, we need to take another look at who Jesus is and what Jesus means to us. Each of the two major political parties has candidates and supporters who are Christian. Sitting in our pews on Sunday mornings are people with a spectrum of political views, yet we all profess our faith in Jesus as Lord, Savior, Son of God, and Messiah. So what do these terms mean? Who is this Jesus?

Jesus asked his disciples this question, "Who do you say that I am?" Who do you say Jesus is? How would you describe Jesus? And just as important, how do you follow Jesus in your life? During Lent we will rediscover who Jesus is or perhaps discover Jesus all over again as we journey to and through the cross. Is Jesus the kind Savior who taught us nice ways to live? Does Jesus live eternally to serve our personal needs and then take us to heaven when we die? Have you ever thought of Jesus as a rebel, a renegade, or a revolutionary? In his book, *Renegade Gospel: The Rebel Jesus*, Mike Slaughter of Ginghamsburg Salem News February 2016 UMC claims that Jesus came to begin a radical movement of God which was revolutionary and subversive. Jesus announced his mission as one that would "bring good news to the poor...proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free" (Luke 4:18). These words clashed with both the political Roman kingdom and the religious kingdom of the first century. Do these words still clash with the political and religious kingdoms of the 21<sup>st</sup> century?

During Lent many will "give something up for Lent" such as chocolate, sodas, etc. in a vain attempt to refocus on Jesus. Instead of giving something up this Lent, I invite each of us to (re)read one Gospel, your choice: Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. Take note of what Jesus says and to whom he says it. Think on how his words and actions were threatening the status quo of his first century culture. Think also on how his words can still challenge our lives in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Which Gospel will you read?

# <u>Here is how you find out about the cancellation</u> of the services before getting in your car:

Call the church at (301) 774-7772 after 7:00 am on Sunday and listen to the recorded message.

- **1.** Rev. Sue will attempt to call all regular participants of the 8:15 am service to announce the cancellation of that service.
- 2. Check your email. If you've subscribed to the church's email list, you'll find a message by 7:00 am on Sunday for the 8:15 service and by 9:00 am for the 10:00 service.
- **3.** If you have access to the internet, visit Salem's Facebook page. The message will be posted by 7:00 am on Sunday.

Here is how the church makes the decision about the service cancellation:

When there is a concern about the impending weather (such as freezing rain and heavy snowfall) that might affect the congregation coming to church, the Salem Trustee Chair and Pastor review weather forecasts and decide by 6:30 am whether to cancel Sunday services.

Please note that occasionally the 8:15 am service will be cancelled but the 10:00 am service held, based on weather conditions and the ability to clear the sidewalks and parking lot. If you attend the 10 am service, check your email after 9:00 am for confirmation.

## **CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING**

Church Council Meeting Highlights January 27, 2016

- Our first meeting of 2016 was well attended. Thank you to all Council members who braved the snowy roads to come together to do God's work.
  - Debbie Ambrose opened the meeting with a devotion based on Matthew 5: 13-16 from the Message. Here we are called to be "light, bringing out the God colors in the world." Our meeting focused on shining our light to our church, the community and the world.
  - Rev. Sue reported on December worship attendance. The average was 87.
    Christmas Eve attendance totaled 171 at both services. Concern was shared for Hasashi Yamagata. His father had a stroke and Hasashi has gone to Japan to be with him.
  - Chet Babylon and Nancy Cox from the Cemetery Committee reported on the work of the committee. They have been working diligently to review and revise the operating procedures of the cemetery. They have also produced a new pamphlet about our cemetery. Keep your eyes open for this. It will be available to all very soon. Thanks to the entire committee for your hard work.
  - Bill Lavely was elected as the new Lay Leader. He will now serve alongside Ginny Weinberger. He fills the vacancy left by the passing of John Howes.
  - + Rev. Sue shared the church Statistical Report that was sent to the Baltimore -

Washington Conference for 2015. This includes membership information, financial information, and information about our assets. Contact Rev. Sue if you would like a copy.

- Kulley Bancroft shared year-end financial +information for 2015. While last year's budget was written to include a \$19,000 negative balance, we ended the year with a positive balance of \$3,300!!!! All apportionments are paid for last year. Thanks to all for your generous giving and support of our ministries. Kulley shared the balances of our three investment accounts (Cemetery, Legacy, and Endowment). We are awaiting our yearend statements from the Mid-Atlantic United Methodist Foundation. Kulley and Rev. Sue will be getting together to make final revisions to our updated Financial Policy.
- Financial Statements for 2015 giving will be mailed this week. These statements will not include contributions to the Legacy Fund. Statements of this giving will be sent separately.
- Sharon Craddock has resigned as our Financial Secretary as of March 1. The Lay Leadership committee will be looking for someone to fill this position. Interested? Contact Rev. Sue.
- We discussed the development of our church Goals for 2016. We began by looking at Rev. Sue's pastoral goals, considered input from Erin Wheeler and arrived at 3 goals for 2016. We will be working on ways to:
  - 1. Increase attendance
  - 2. Find new ways to reach out to the community

3. Continue to streamline our various church accounts into one Operating Account.

We will be forming a work group to spearhead actions and activities that will address these goals

#### THE WINDOWS OF SALEM UMC, BROOKEVILLE, MD

For this second article about the people mentioned in the stained glass windows of Salem United Methodist Church, Brookeville, MD, I have chosen 3 more windows of people related to each other, but this time it is not as obvious as they do not share the same last name. Just a reminder: For ease of discussion I have numbered the windows, with number 1 being the one in the choir loft, front right of church. Follow around that north facing wall with windows 1-5, then 6-8 together in the back of the church, the east facing wall, and on around. The sources I used are: "The Book of Names, Genealogical Record of a Community": the history of Brookeville; the Federal Census records as found on www.ancestry.com; and cemetery records on www.findagrave.com. These window articles are just a simple overview of facts from these public documents.

This article will begin with window 1:



Window 1 is inscribed: "In Memory of Samuel & Louisa Hopkins" Samuel J. Hopkins (Sept. 17, 1822- Aug 23, 1873) married Sept. 25, 1845 to Louisa Elizabeth Day (July 13, 1824- Oct. 27, 1895). Samuel was a saddler. They had 4 children: Samuel Jefferson Hopkins (July 4, 1846 – Dec. 13, 1927); Hiram W. Hopkins (May 8, 1849 – Aug. 1, 1916); Eliza S. Hopkins (Sept. 28, 1850-Feb. 21, 1930) and Mary L., (b. 1857). Samuel is buried in the Hopkins family cemetery, Lisbon, MD; Louisa is buried in the Salem cemetery.

Their daughter, Eliza, married William Miller, and that brings us to window 2:



Window 2 is inscribed: "In Memory of Wm. B. Miller"

William B. Miller (June 4, 1851- Nov. 9, 1894) was married to Eliza S. Hopkins (Sept. 28, 1850-Feb. 21, 1930). William was a wheelwright and undertaker. They had 2 daughters: Elizabeth L., b. 1875, and Nellie M., b. 1884. William died at age 43 and was buried in the Salem cemetery. After his death Eliza married Seth Warfield Griffith (Jan. 10, 1860-Nov. 4, 1935). Seth and Eliza are also buried in the Salem cemetery.

Eliza is also related, as daughter-in-law, to the dedicatees of window 5:



Window 5 is inscribed: "In Memory of Leebus and Ruth S. Griffith"

Leebus Griffith (Feb 11, 1804- Feb 5, 1889) was married Jan 26, 1858 to Ruth S. Warfield Page 8 (Jan. 31, 1828- Nov. 13, 1882). Leebus was a farmer. Ruth was his second wife and they had 5 children: Ida May Griffith Waters (Nov. 27, 1858 – May 9, 1883); Seth Warfield Griffith (Jan. 10, 1860-Nov. 4, 1935); Florence Cornelia Griffith Etchison (May 8, 1861 – Sept. 25, 1933); Robert E. Lee Griffith (July 15, 1862 – Feb 8. 1947); Clarence M. (Nov. 17, 1864 – Apr. 8, 1924). Leebus is buried in the New Market cemetery; Ruth is buried in the Lorraine Park Cemetery, Woodlawn, MD.

Their son, Seth, married Eliza Hopkins and together Eliza and Seth could have been the ones to give windows 1, 2 and 5. All 5 individuals mentioned on these windows had died by 1895, and so this further supports the idea that the windows were installed at the time the church was built in 1910.
