A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Hello church! Can you believe that spring is upon us and it is almost summer? I love watching the flowers poke up and start to fill

the world with color. It is such a great reminder that God is an artist who loves to create color and beauty all around us.

While the colors of spring are an obvious sign of God's love, it's not always so easy to see, is it? Sometimes we feel like God is very far away. Sometimes, even in the midst of all the beauty in the world, we may wonder where God is.

Where is God in Ukraine? In the continued division in our country and communities? In the politics of our own country? In our own United Methodist denomination?

For those who are not keeping track, because of the pandemic our quadrennial, international General Conference has been postponed three times and will hopefully be held in 2024. This feels like a far-off issue, but it means that we are unable to resolve our issues around LGBTQAI+ inclusion. (It also means we aren't able to conduct important work like budgets, bishop election and retirement, and other things!).

Some churches and individuals are tired of the wait and have taken matters into their own hands. As of May 1, some United Methodist churches have officially withdrawn from our denomination to join a new denomination called the Global Methodist Church. churches have begun to discern a potential future outside the United Methodist Church. However, I am not aware of any churches in our conference that decided to step out on May 1.

To be totally honest, I'm not sure how I feel about this new denomination. On the one hand, I'm happy that there is a place for all of us before God and that the Global Methodist church is creating a place for people who are not comfortable in the UMC. On the other hand, I am deeply sad that we cannot come together to be inclusive of all who seek marriage and ordination. I am sad for the people around the world who feel a call to ministry and will not be able to live out that call without finding a new denominational home.

I don't know the future of the United Methodist Church. I don't know the future of Salem United Methodist Church. What I do know is that no matter how much humans mess things up, God is good and will continue to be good every single day.

To tell another honest truth, it is hard to write about something like a denominational split when there is so much suffering in Ukraine. John Wesley said we ought to be unified in the essentials and charitable about everything else. I think we are all unified in our mourning and support for those experiencing the daily costs of war. Perhaps some of you are so affected by the war that you are currently in "survival mode," like I talked about on Sunday. If you are currently living in survival mode in solidarity with those who are living for true survival, know that my prayers are with you. We can't end the war on our own, but we can continue to pray. Just as I don't know the future for our church, I don't know the future for Ukraine and Russia. I pray that God would intervene, change hearts, and save lives.

Olney HELP

Did you know?



That Olney HELP has been providing food and financial assistance to area families since 1969. That's 52 years! Olney HELP was formerly known as Olney Fish and was started by a group of local Quakers and other area church members. It's a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides short-term emergency food and financial assistance to individuals and families in Olney, Sandy Spring, Ashton, Brinklow, and Brookeville MD.

Olney HELP's Mission is to 1) provide emergency food assistance to residents by delivering a three-to-five day (depending on size of family) supply of fresh and non-perishable food (although due to COVID, gift cards can be given out), 2) provide emergency financial assistance, and 3) provide referral services to other agencies.

Families must fill out an application by email or phone call and food will be boxed. Drivers are needed to deliver food. Due to security concerns, the exact location of the pantry is kept confidential.

Olney HELP supports other organizations, such as St. John's Episcopal Church efforts to feed the homeless. It's surprising how many families are in need in the greater Olney community.

The need is great: the agency has grown to more than 60 volunteers. One volunteer driver said, "My delivery to two elderly black women in Sandy Spring last week actually brought me to tears. Their gratitude and graciousness for the simple act of delivering basic food items will stay with me forever."

Olney HELP Food Donations

You may now leave non-perishable food donations in the box in the meeting room behind the Sanctuary. Suzanne Friis, Nancy Cox, and Joan and Mark Aebig will deliver them to Olney HELP. Most needed items: Canned meats (such as chicken and turkey), canned fruit packed in water versus syrup, pancake syrup, Helpers (hamburger, chicken, tuna), sloppy joe sauce, bottles of shelf stable juice (no juice boxes now), plain pasta sauce, canned condensed low-sodium soups, baked beans, jelly, whole grain pasta sides, instant mashed potatoes, diapers, size 6, snacks for kids. Note that some peanut butters have recently been recalled. If you are interested in volunteering or would like additional information, please call their Helpline at (301) 774-4334
