LEADERSHIP TEAM UPDATE

Summer is over and we are gearing up for another exciting year of ministry at Salem. At our September meeting (9/11/22) your Leadership Team began on several important tasks that we will be working on in the next several months.

- In Preparation for our annual Church Conference (October 29, 2022) we worked on several tasks that will help us complete the reports required by the Baltimore Washington Conference as part of this yearly report of the work of our church.
 1. We looked at our current Mission and Vision statements with an eye to revising and updating them. These are in progress and will be shared with the congregation when they are finished.
 2. We checked in with members of the team who are working on various required reports to be shared at Church Conference including: our Membership Report, Financial Report, Trustees Report, and Discipleship Report.  3. We have a church Work Day coming up on October 2. Please join us to help in taking care of our beautiful building.

ADDITIONAL LEADERSHIP INFO

For a few years now Salem UMC has been moving towards finding the best way to lead our church. We have leaned towards a Leadership Board type model as a way to foster more effective and streamlined committee and decision making structure.

Salem is not unique in this effort. Many large churches are also adopting this model of leadership.

In a nutshell, the Simplified Accountability Structure (SAS) combines the "Four Hats" (Council, Finance, Trustees and SPRC committees) into a single nine member Leadership Board. The board and Pastor will be held accountable to each other and the parishioners.

At each monthly meeting the Leadership Team focus is on the work that needs to be done in mission, ministry and upkeep. That is followed a week later by the Grace in Action meeting where we invite discussion with all parishioners either in the Community Hall or online.

Updates will appear occasionally in future newsletters.

MUSICAL INSTRUCTION

Hello Salem UMC, Brookeville, and the greater Olney region!

Starting this summer (AND CONTINUING INTO THE FALL!), free musical instruction will be provided by Alan Naylor, Minister of Music at Salem United Methodist Church and Helen Hayes Award Winner. This program will be available to ALL regardless of connection to Salem UMC, skill level, background, or interest. Young, old, beginner or music professional... all are invited to participate.

Since this is a new outreach intended to provide access to any who desire it, the program will be a work in progress that grows and is flexible to accommodate the needs and desires of those who choose to come for learning. In order to be respectful of different needs, abilities, and background knowledge, 15 minute rolling consultation slots will be offered throughout the months so that group classes versus individual instruction can be arranged. Once these assessments have taken place, classes of 30-60 minutes and individual instruction of 15-30 minutes will be arranged.



OCTOBER SERMON SERIES



2 Timothy: Equipped to do Good

What does it mean to be equipped to do good in the world? 2 Timothy is one of three “pastoral letters” in the New Testament. This means they are written to specific people in a specific context—similar to a mentoring email today. When we read these letters we get a window into Pauline teaching that helps us to understand the kinds of worries first- and second-century Christians had. In 2 Timothy, we see the author (possibly Paul, but not definitely) taking time to advise his charge on matters of faith and leadership. Some of the letter would be only applicable to the recipient, while other parts are general to all Christians. We will focus on some sections that apply to everyone, even though I

encourage you to read the short letter in its entirety. Be equipped.

Olney HELP Food Donations

(Updated 08/18/22)—THE PANTRY IS CRITICALLY LOW! You may leave non-perishable food donations in the box in the Meeting Room behind the Sanctuary or in the marked box in the Community Hall. Nancy Cox, and Joan and Mark Aebig will deliver them to Olney HELP. Most needed items: boxed spaghetti, pancake syrup, jelly, canned pasta (esp. adult), pasta sauce, canned chicken/tuna/salmon/beef stew/corned beef, canned peas, corn & green beans, canned fruit, baked beans, fruit juice (both shelf stable bottles and juice boxes for kids – 100% juice only), instant potatoes (boxed), 1 lb. bags white rice, Rice a Roni, coffee, tea, dessert mixes and snacks for kids (granola bars, raisins, crackers, Goldfish). Currently they do not need any soups, other beans (kidney, pinto, black, etc), mac and cheese or peanut butter. They are always in need of size 5 and 6 diapers. They do not need baby food as most families are finding it less expensive and healthier to make their own.

APPALACHIA SERVICE PROJECT

Since ASP trips have been put on hold for a couple years, I'd like to include something in the newsletter to remind us of your service and God's grace.

Reflections on ASP experiences

First, this isn't about "you or me" when we go down there. That said, each year now I have learned a great deal more about "me" than I had known before I went. Each year has been a personally very intense experience in so many ways. Each year brings new insight into my faith, my relationships with others, and with my God. Each year I have learned side by side with the "kids" - - for me it has been as humbling as it has been exhilarating and this is a good thing.

Second, the "kids" ... our "kids" they're not "kids" they are smart, inquisitive, impulsive, energetic, open minded, youth who are just plain fun to be around. If there is an "anti-aging" prescription, at least for me, our youth and the ASP experience is probably it. I come back feeling not that I didn't do enough, but that I was able to do so much, learn so much more than I had expected we would. Each year I leave realizing that I had a lot of fun being around everyone not just the folks we help, or the "Salem Family Contingent" ... but everyone. I find that I get so much out of working with the youth, and I have found that they are open to learning from us ... ahem, "older youth <at heart>. Win Win Win!

This year was, as it always is, a reality check ... a real "reality show" ... and in some sense a "survival show" It's about serious issues, bad luck or no luck, about tough, tough people and vulnerable children. It was about fun, jump shots and "red neck puzzles" ... unwinding at the local ice cream shop ... it was about warped boards and levers, chemistry and concrete, ... but most of all it was really just all about learning of GOD's wonderful world and how to live in it - - together.

What do I think? I think that the ASP experience, the boot camp like atmosphere, and the fact that we all know that we each have to depend on each other leads each of us to appreciate the meaning of our own faith in God That in the end, we also have to depend on God. We had the opportunity to be challenged collectively. This broke down barriers to communication. It makes adults young again, and it makes the youth suddenly "older" ... it makes us one with God.



A note from Joan Aebig: Thank you, Fred, for sharing your thoughts with us. I can imagine that you've been on many trips. Probably Buck Bartley and Hisashi Yamagata led all or most of them. I do know that Salem has participated with ASP for at least fifteen years. This is a blessed thing.
