#### A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



"Who is my neighbor?"

This is the question that the "expert in the law" asks Jesus in at attempt at a *gotcha* moment. Most of us know the story of the "Good" Samaritan that follows in Luke 10 (if you don't—go look it up and email me one thing that stands out to you!).

In that story we see a man foolishly walking alone down a notorious street, inevitably get beaten up, robbed, and left for dead.

We don't know much about that mannothing about his nationality or religious leanings. Jesus' original audience may say he was reckless or asking for it. Nobody in their right mind traveled that road alone. According to them, no moral person traveled from Jerusalem, the seat of Jewish religious power, down to Jericho, where the Samaritans lived. So, he was going from what Jesus' audience would consider a "good" place down to a "bad" place.

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Jesus' audience may not have liked this man right off the bat.

And yet Jesus uses this unlikable man to show the hypocrisy of the religious people and religious leaders. None of them took the time to stop and help this man on his death bed. (we'll ignore that they're also ostensibly foolishly traveling alone on a morally bad route...).

Then, (horror of horrors!) Jesus has a Samaritan help the foolish injured man. Nobody in Jesus' audience liked Samaritans. I bet they were the bad-guy foil to heroes in bedtime stories for kids.

This unlikely guy becomes the hero of the story. To this day, we call Samaritans "good" because of this story. It's the best public relations the Samaritans could have hoped for!

Why am I telling you this story?

Our country, county, and community have been asking "who is my neighbor?" and what *is* my responsibility to my neighbor?

Jesus doesn't answer the question. He tells the story and then invites his audience to ask themselves, "Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" They correctly answer, "The one who showed him mercy."

Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

## Olney HELP Food Needs

You may leave non-perishable food donations in the box under the table in the sanctuary or in the marked box in the Community Hall. Most needed items: instant potatoes - both box and pouch, pancake syrup, baked beans, refried beans, and canned fruit in juice or fruit cups. Also, canned pasta (adult types), shelf stable bottled juice, canned chili, canned chicken, sloppy joe sauce, canned tomatoes (prefer low salt), spaghetti sauce - plain kind, canned meats, such as tuna, chicken, turkey, corned beef, spam, salmon, Vienna sausage, etc.; 1 lb. bags of rice and rice sides (Knorr/Roni), pasta sides (Knorr/Roni), baked beans, canned green beans, canned fruit in juice, jelly - all sizes, all flavors, condiments -BBQ sauce, ketchup, mustard, salad dressing; instant mashed potatoes - pouches and boxes, juice boxes for the kids (100% juice please).

You can also drop off Giant gift cards at the Giant Customer Service desk, and they will hold them for Olney Help.

Mary Kay became involved in church life and during the years when there were two Sunday Worship Services, she attended the 8:15 service and served as an acolyte, usher and scripture reader. She assisted the Salem United Methodist Women's group by helping serve dinners at the Olney Sandy Spring Lions Club monthly meetings held in Salem's community hall. Mary Kay also served as Recording Secretary of the Church Council (now known as the Leadership Team).

For the past ten years, Mary Kay has been Salem's church treasurer, responsible for paying bills, paying church staff, recording all income, expenses and donations, and reporting the church's financial status at monthly Leadership Team meetings. She works closely with Rev. Emily and the Leadership Team calculating the annual budget and completing the yearly Statistical Report required by the Baltimore Washington Conference.

The God Job of church Treasurer is a commitment that requires weekly attention to ensure that Salem operates smoothly. Mary Kay manages her Salem duties while working full-time as Operations Manager at CWTSato Travel where she has been employed for 33 years.

# REMEMBERING MILDRED ALBRIGHT

Do you remember a wonderful, loving lady named Mildred Albright? It depends upon how long you've been at Salem. Mildred was born in 1907 and passed away on August 16, 1979. She was the mother of Carole Janney, and aunt of Jean Karl, both current members of Salem. Mildred was a long-time member of our church, having joined on December 2, 1945 by profession of faith. She remained a member until she died.

Church was such an important part of Mildred's life. She attended worship services every Sunday. Living just five houses south on High Street, she'd walk to church bringing her children and later her grandchildren to Sunday School. She loved serving on committees, such as the Staff-Parish Relations Committee. She also served on the United Methodist Women's Aid Society, and for some time, was its president. This society, meeting in members' homes, pursued many activities including wrapping bandages in WWII and holding biannual oyster supper fundraisers. Daughter Carole remembers "padding oysters", an old term for the method--coating oysters in crumbs and often the practice of binding two oysters together in a single patty. (It's a bit of an old-fashioned technique, but you still see it on menus of restaurants in the DelMarVa.) These suppers grew into huge affairs, serving 1000 people! The Society also held bake sales, with Mildred routinely making applesauce cakes, coconut cakes and hard rolls which sold like hotcakes.

Have you noticed the **eternal flame**, the red lamp on the wall to the left of the altar? Our eternal flame burns continuously, as in many Methodist churches, in memory of Christ. It was given in 1979 in honor of Mildred Albright by her family and friends a couple months following her death. We are blessed to have this beautiful lamp in our sanctuary in honor of a giving, kind lady, devoted to our church and serving God.
