A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



The world wants me to pick sides. I am for something, or against it? And yet, there are so many times when I believe a little bit like these people, a little bit like those, and a lot like someone else. No two people are exactly alike, so why should I have to try to think the same way as a whole group, political party, or denomination? That seems like a recipe for ignoring my own intuition and shutting out the still small voice in my soul. Have you ever felt like you couldn't add nuance into a conversation without getting shut down? Black and white thinking has become more and more common and will continue to escalate as we grope towards the November election.

And yet, we are not called to be a people who pick sides. Our faith is not built to give us easy answers or shallow understanding. Some truths are simple—God loves you. That will never change. But God calls us to paradoxical things! We are called to be weak to be strong. We are told that the cross, adevice of torture and death, is where true

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life is found. We are taught that being last is the only way to be first, that we need to lose our lives to find it, that humility is the way to greatness, and that we find unity in diversity. What madness is this?

If we ignore these paradoxes and seek a false simplicity, we'll probably be fine on the surface. But we'll miss the depth of God's love and creativity. We'll be so focused on being comfortable (as we are in most aspects of our American life) that we'll be unable to cope with the discomfort of meeting someone with a different opinion. And then, those divisions that we've been seeing in our communities? They'll never heal.

This September you are invited to get uncomfortable in your faith. To ask questions you haven't asked before and to seek opinions that you've never considered. Explore the paradoxes of our faith and grow in ways you never imagined.

Olney HELP Food Needs

You may leave non-perishable food donations in the box under the table in the sanctuary or in the marked box in the Community Hall. Most needed items: instant potatoes – both box and pouch, pancake syrup, baked beans, refried beans, and canned fruit in juice or fruit cups. Also, canned pasta (adult types), shelf stable bottled juice, canned chili, canned chicken, sloppy joe sauce, canned tomatoes (prefer low salt), spaghetti sauce – plain kind, canned meats, such as tuna, chicken, turkey, corned beef, spam, salmon, Vienna sausage, etc.; 1 lb. bags of rice and rice sides (Knorr/Roni), pasta sides (Knorr/Roni), baked beans, canned green beans, canned fruit in juice, jelly - all sizes, all flavors, condiments -BBQ sauce, ketchup, mustard, salad dressing; instant mashed potatoes - pouches and boxes, juice boxes for the kids (100% juice please).

You can also drop off Giant gift cards at the Giant Customer Service desk, and they will hold them for Olney Help.

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BOOK STUDY

I Think You're Wrong (But I'm Listening): a guide to grace-filled political conversations by Sarah Steward Holland and Beth Silvers

Friends, I am so tired of arguing about politics. Not because I'm afraid of disagreeing with people, but because political arguments don't seem to go anywhere anymore. Within the first few minutes we both know the other isn't going to change their minds, or maybe even listen at all. Why do we bother?

More importantly, what does it mean to have these discussions as Christians who are called to care about the whole world? Jesus calls us the salt of the earth. We are to be an example to the world, and yet we can't even keep our religious discussions civil! This fall we're working on exiting black and white thinking and seeing the good in others (yes, even in the people we don't agree with!). This book has been hugely helpful to me in figuring out how and why I should talk to people about politics inside and outside the church differently. If there was time, I'd schedule dramatic readings of it at everyone's house before bed. Instead, join me for a (much less intrusive!) book study this fall.

P.S. Obviously you'll get more out of these classes if you read the book. However, life gets busy. If you don't get a chance to read and just want to join the discussion to learn from each other, you are still more than welcome.

STANDING ON THE SHOULDERS OF GIANTS

Debbie Ambrose attended a Presbyterian church growing up and later married her husband, Fred, in that very same church. While living in Kensington, MD, they both were very active at Warner Memorial Presbyterian church where Debbie served as an Elder and Fred served as a Deacon.

In the early 1980s, they moved to Olney and their very good friends, Rob and Barb McClosky invited them to attend Salem United Methodist Church which at one time was a small country church and the social center of Brookeville.

They liked the friendliness and energy of the congregation and began attending regularly with their children, Katharine and Mark, who went to Sunday School and joined in youth activities. Their friend, Barbara, got Fred involved with the Appalachian Service Project and Debbie joined Salem's small choir. "Being in the choir was very fulfilling...the people made the project," she said.

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Debbie's God Jobs expanded as she served on committees, organized Sunday School formats and schedules, and participated in fundraisers. One of the largest fundraisers was the Annual Yard Sale and Basket Sale. The baskets, overseen by master arranger Kulley Bancroft, were filled with handcrafted items and sold for \$40-50 each. Debbie helped make and sell baskets and also worked in the community hall kitchen making food to sell to event attendees: hot dogs and chili and the famous vegetable beef soup.

Debbie retired from serving as an administrator in Montgomery County Public Schools in 2012 and volunteered even more time at Salem. She served at the Annual Ham & Oyster dinners, prepared by Salem's "very accomplished cooks," according to Debbie, organized Vacation Bible School, supervised Arts & Crafts for Christian Day Camp and, for four years, was Chair of the Church Council (now known as The Leadership Team).

She is currently a member of The Encore Singers, a Montgomery County based adult chamber group that sings both sacred and secular music and holds their practices at Salem.

Debbie, we 'stand on your shoulders' benefitting today from your leadership skills, your planning and organizational expertise and your fundraising efforts. Thank you!

HISTORY CORNER

Have you seen the History Corner located in the Meeting Room? That's the room with the copier.



There is a glass-lidded case containing a 30+ page book called "In Remembrance" which lists the items donated to Salem, perhaps back in the '60's, '70's and '80's. You'll also find a baptismal font donated by the family of Manetia E. Gartrell in her honor. Old photos, plaques, and a map of Brookeville adorn the wall. Come take a look!

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

Back in 2016, starting in the January newsletter, Rose Eide-Altman, Salem's music director, wrote a series of articles on the stained-glass windows in our sanctuary. If you've ever wondered about the names on

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these beautiful windows, we thought reprinting some of this information here might be of interest. She wrote about the windows in the January, February, and March issues.

On the right side of the sanctuary, near the middle, is the stained-glass window:

"In Memory of Margaret J. Parsly"

Margaret J. Parsly (June 3, 1822-January 8, 1895) was listed in the census as a seamstress, and the records never include a husband so apparently, she never married. She is sister to George Parsley, Sr. (who also has a window, see future newsletter). Margaret is buried in the Salem cemetery with the last name spelled "Parsley", not "Parsly" as in the window.

The Maryland State Archives also records the name as "Parsley", not "Parsly". Margaret and George had three other siblings. Their parents were James Parsley (c. 1785-1834) and Margaret Anderson Parsley. By 1823, the couple had their five children, all under the age of 10. James, a shoemaker, was the first Constable of Brookeville.

SUMMER GARDEN PROJECT

This summer we worked with 4 teens, 3 preelementary school students, 2 neighbors, and assorted parents to work on our garden. If we're looking at trends, we are more successful at growing vined plants than anything else. This year we planted mini watermelons and potatoes. Half of the watermelons grew and none of the potatoes! It's giving me flashbacks to the successful pumpkins and unsuccessful... everything else of last year!

One major change we started this year is our determination to share our produce with those in need. We will work with Cristin Cooper, of Coop's Soups, to harvest (or buy!) food we can then learn to make into soup that we will donate to a local soup kitchen. Cristin has been working on making and donating soup for the last year as part of a grant, so she is excited to work alongside our teens and kids and help them give back.
